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Welcome

All housing associations invest in communities. Most do this through the development of good quality affordable homes, some go further and develop community programmes which help build resilient communities.

Based in South Manchester, Wythenshawe Community Housing Group is a community landlord that goes further. With some 14,000 homes and 20,000 tenants within four square miles, our vision is to create a community where people choose to live and work.

Working in partnership over the last 15 years, Wythenshawe Community Housing Group has developed a particularly strong track record in successful community investment. A recent independent analysis showed that our investments have generated a fivefold social return for the Wythenshawe Community.

This brochure offers an insight into how we're working: with private sector partners such as Costa Coffee and Mitie to enable local employment - reducing recruitment costs and getting the right person into the job first time; with Manchester City Council to support

young people across Wythenshawe to keep safe, improve their health and get into jobs; and with Manchester City Council, our local hospital, social enterprises, charities, and colleges to leverage in Big Lottery funding and deliver towards the vision for Wythenshawe as Manchester's Garden City.

Real Opportunities

Our frontline staff are trained to speak to local residents about job opportunities when they come into contact during their normal work.

Job seekers who sign up to the programme are given careers advice and sign-posted to local training opportunities. They are also alerted to any job opportunities that come up.

> 71% of signups resulted in full work or training

Talent Pool

Wythenshawe Community Housing Group provides job matching and recruitment service for local employers.

Since 2011 we have had over 50 apprentices through the business, with a 100% retention rate. 38 apprentices are currently working across our business in apprenticeships lasting up to 4 years.

Bespoke Services based at the Business Enterprise Centre were looking for a local Admin Officer and turned to the Talent Pool to recruit. Wayne Evans, their CEO, said "We pride ourselves on employing local people – 82% of our staff are tenants in Wythenshawe – and we were only too happy to add to this tally with Vicky's addition to their workforce." Real Food Wythenshawe is a 5 year £1million Big Lottery funded community food project. It aims to inspire local people in Wythenshawe about the food they eat, with a slogan of "Grow it. Cook it. Eat it!"

The project is part of our strategy to help improve the health of the people of Wythenshawe, who have some of the highest levels of long-term illness, disability and heart disease.



Nigel Wilson, Chief Executive WCHG said: "We are committed to helping people be more aware of not smoking during pregnancy and not having smoking in their homes, so that babies in Wythenshawe get the best possible start to their lives".



Over the last year in Manchester, smoking rates at time of delivery went down to

12.5%, lower than the England average.

Investing wisely: Community Funding

Wythenshawe Community Development Grants are available for local voluntary and community groups for funding of up to £2,500 towards their projects.

Out and About: Our Community Centres

Community Centres are at the heart of our neighbourhoods. Places to meet, volunteer, learn new skills, play sport, gain qualifications, celebrate with friends and family or just have a bite to eat.

Wythenshawe Community Housing Group supports the delivery of community services through community centres in Benchill and Woodhouse Park. The centres are funded through a combination of grant funding and facilities hire.

The main funders are:









Benchill Community Centre

Benchill Community Centre is a fantastic hub of activities for all ages and local people in Wythenshawe. The building is owned by Wythenshawe Community Housing Group and managed by a committee of local people. Its facilities include:

- After School and Holiday provision for children aged 6 to 14 years
- IT facilities for beginners, elderly residents and people wanting to gain qualifications to improve employment opportunities
- "Talk English" a programme to enable people to learn English at pre-entry level
- Community Arts programme for local disabled residents to socialise with other local residents

Baker Tilly conducted a Social Return on Investment analysis of four of community investments, which found that each year the projects return

£30 million

worth of social value to the Wythenshawe Community.
