






Asbestos Aware

Our new leaflet on asbestos (enclosed with this edition) contains vital information for tenants and leaseholders. Please take time to read it for details of our policy and retain it for reference.



Although nearly all our

homes have received major refurbishment over the last 15 years there may still be materials in some homes which contain asbestos. Materials containing asbestos, if in good condition, are often best left where they are and monitored.

If you are considering carrying out DIY on your home, you should always submit a formal request using the Tenants Alteration form available on our website or by contacting us on the phone. Inspections may be required to assess the area before you undertake work.

At the cutting edge!

Thanks to partnership working with Manchester City Council over the last two years, we are improving the way we deliver the grass cutting service.

One team will work across the area, rather than two. This will:

- promote working together with MCC
- · make it easier to cover for annual leave
- minimise the impact of machinery breakdowns
- allow us to continue to litter pick before cutting grass

Our target for 2016 is to reduce the number of days we cut to minimise the amount of grass left behind. We will do at least 13 cuts a year.

The grass cutting teams will be supported by six litter pickers from our Futures Trainees programme, giving local people the opportunity to get back into work, see page 16.

How to avoid the SUMMER TIME BLUES

Make a budget so you know exactly how much you have to spend over the holidays and stick to it!

The long summer holidays can put a lot of pressure on the family budget.

Don't risk falling into debt with your rent or finding yourself borrowing money to pay for essentials, holiday activities or summer clothes.

Before you start planning for your school holiday activities, work out your budget. Discuss it with

your children and get them involved in working out how much activities will cost.

You could set a daily or weekly spending limit and then ask your children to work out activities that are priced within that limit.



We know it can be hard if children expect to have the same holiday experiences, toys and trips as their friends but there are plenty of fun things families and children can do for free.

FREE ACTIVITIES TO DO AT HOME:

Plant a vegetable garden – even if you only have a small outdoor area you can create a simple vegetable patch with your kids or you could plant seeds in pots on a window sill.

Cooking – plan a day of cooking or baking with your kids – this is a cost effective activity because you get to eat the results!

Movie night – borrow some movies from your local library and have a cinema experience in your home.

Games and toys – get out old toys or games that haven't been used in a while and organise swaps with friends and families or have a car boot or yard sale. Visit a charity shop and pick up cheap toys.

Arts and crafts – try face painting, painting or making masks or jewellery. Use craft materials from around your home – it's amazing what you can create from buttons and bits and pieces from your kitchen drawers.

Read a book – get your children to pick a few books you can read together as a family over the school holidays. Borrow books for free from your local library.

Playdates – invite one or two of your child's friends over to play for a low cost day at home. Provide paint and paper, toys or dressing

up gear and the kids will be happy for hours.



SCHOOL HOLIDAY ACTIVITIES OUT AND ABOUT:

Depending on your budget and transport options, there are plenty of low cost school holiday activities away from home:

Libraries – visit your local library and see if they have a free story time. Libraries also run other school holiday

activities like arts and craft and computer courses for older kids.



Go to the park – take your kids to the Wythenshawe Games (see p19) or any other local park. You can take your bike, walk the dog or use the playgrounds. Pack refillable drink bottles and a picnic so

you're not paying out for food and drinks at cafes or shops.

Shopping Centres – these sometimes hold free school holiday activities that your children might enjoy such as live entertainment, music or art and craft activities.

Community Centres – both Benchill Community Centre and Woodhouse Park lifestyle Centre will be running events over the summer, details of how to contact them are in this newsletter.

Edible Interchange springing into life

Spring and summer 2016 see a variety of new plants and edible flowers take root at the Edible Interchange.

As the plants become more established in traditional beds across the interchange site and in four substantial planters at the bus stops opposite the Metrolink station, we hope passersby will take sprigs of herbs home to enhance their cooking. Other produce will also be shared with volunteers and interested travellers!

Launched in summer 2015, Wythenshawe's Edible interchange is a partnership project with Real Food Wythenshawe supported by Transport for Greater Manchester (TGFM), Groundwork Manchester, Manchester City Council and the Forum Trust.

Students from Newall Green High School have been assisting with winter maintenance. Haveley Hey and The Willows will also be joining 'Friends of the Interchange' to keep the growing on track.

Volunteers to help weed, plant and support this project are very welcome. We meet every Tuesday afternoon from 1.30pm at the Interchange site next to the Forum in Wythenshawe Civic Centre.





Non Charging Weeks

A reminder to Willow Park Housing Trust tenants that your rents calendar changed from April 2016 to bring you in line with all our other tenants. It has no effect on the amount of rent that is charged and it is still payable over 50 weeks of the financial year as per your tenancy agreement.

We can provide all our tenants with a rent calendar to keep in your payment card carrier which details non collection weeks. If you have any queries or would like a calendar please contact the rents team through our Contact Centre.

Benefit Cap reduced

The Benefit Cap has been reduced. Later in the year, for those who live outside of London, it is set at:

£384.62 a week
if you are a
couple or have children

£257.69 a week for a single person

The cap limits the total amount of income "working age" households can receive from certain benefits. If you are affected by the reduction in the Benefit Cap, your Housing Benefit will be reduced at some point after April 2016. Exact dates have not yet been decided.

Call the Financial Inclusion Team via our Contact Centre if you are worried you may be affected. You may be entitled to a benefit that would make you exempt or be able to claim temporary help to meet the Housing Benefit shortfall.

Universal Credit CHECK LIST

If you have a change in your circumstances and claim Universal Credit (UC) we have the following check list to help you. Remember, you can always contact our dedicated officers for help, see right:

if you want help making your claim because you don't have access or are not confident using the internet, contact us and we will make an appointment for you to come in

do not make a claim for Universal Credit if you are still due your last payment from work or holiday pay

take key information with you to your first interview at the job centre: a copy of your tenancy agreement and rent statement. Contact us for this information

confirm when your first payment date will be and let us know and we can offer advice and support on how to manage while waiting for your first payment which will be approximately six weeks from making your claim

claim Council Tax Support – as soon as you make your claim for UC you need to claim Council Tax Support separately. This can be done via MCC's web site or we have paper claim forms available

if you have a change in circumstances, such as starting work, that will affect your payment, you must let us know

Meet... our Universal Credit Officers

Vicki Broadbent and **Liam Knocker** support tenants receiving Universal Credit, particularly those finding it hard to a move from weekly to monthly payments.

They can:

- check your Universal Credit claim is correct and support you if you need to contact the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP)
- help set up monthly budgets to ensure all your bills are paid
- advise on benefit advances during your first assessment period
- tell you what to do if you have been sanctioned
- signpost you to services to help with your work search

Fancy a change?

If you want to make improvements, alterations and additions to your property, we are happy for you to do so provided they are in line with your tenancy agreement.

This means you must get our written permission **BEFORE YOU START ANY WORK.** This applies to any kind of alteration other than decorating, for example:

- · removing internal walls
- taking out or replacing any built in fixtures or fittings
- putting up any structure like a shed or play house in the garden
- cutting down trees or removing hedges or other boundaries to create a driveway
- altering the type of flooring in the property
- · fitting a satellite dish, aerial, CCTV or other equipment

Laminate floors - the ups and downs

Laminate flooring can look great, but there are some downsides.

- it is much more difficult to lift up if any work is needed below, and you would be responsible for lifting and re-fixing it
- there is a lot less insulation than underlay and carpets so ground floor temperatures will be colder and that can increase the risk of condensation in your home

If you want to fit laminate flooring, complete a Tenant's Alteration form before you fit it and we can then discuss all the pros and cons with you.

Gadget Power!

CLAIM YOUR FREE HYGROMETER

This is a special type of thermometer that can go on the table, worktop or wall to monitor the humidity and temperature in your home.

By helping you understand how humid it is and knowing how warm or cold it is, you can take action to prevent condensation which will create black mould.

To claim your free hygrometer ask at reception in Wythenshawe House or Parkway Green House. If you have condensation you can request a surveyor's visit to advise you and they will also provide you with a free hygrometer.





FIRE WARNING

We want you to be both warm and safe! Wood burning and other solid fuel stoves are increasingly popular, but if you want to install one you must first check with us:

- to install one without permission is against the terms of our tenancy agreements
- by law, all new appliances must be fitted by a HETAS (Heating Equipment Testing & Approval Scheme) registered installer and servicing agent and a carbon monoxide detector must be fitted. Unless you requested permission BEFORE solid fuel is installed we will not have checked that this is the case
- solid fuel appliances that burn wood or coal must be serviced by WCHG twice a year meaning these systems cost us more to maintain than other heating systems

If, during our annual inspections, we find an unauthorised solid fuel appliance has been fitted the gas engineer will ask for the solid fuel installation record to check it was carried out by a recognised HETAS installer. If you are unable to provide this you may be re-charged for any remedial works in addition to the costs of the six monthly service inspections.



WCHG has been praised for the part it played in helping police catch a drugs gang.

At Manchester Crown Court, Stuart Walsh was jailed for eight years after pleading guilty to conspiracy to supply amphetamine: Christopher Swaine and Daniel Whelan were both sentenced to 42 months after pleading guilty to conspiracy to supply amphetamine, cocaine and heroin; a 17-year-old was sentenced to a two-year detention training order for his role and Steven Anderson, who had pleaded guilty to possession with intent to supply cannabis at an earlier hearing, was sentenced to 12 months in prison.

The drugs gang was smashed after police raided their safehouses, including two in Wythenshawe. Police also went undercover as addicts.

Greater Manchester Police Inspector Derek Hewitt said: "The court results are evidence of all the hard work and commitment by GMP, the community and partner agencies such as Wythenshawe Community Housing Group to make Wythenshawe a safe place to live, work and visit.

"The community and GMP have stood shoulderto-shoulder to take a strong stance against those involved In drug related activity in Wythenshawe."

Group Chief Executive of WCHG Nigel Wilson said: "Joint work with our colleagues in GMP has a key role in helping to keep our community safer and reducing the risks from these forms of criminal activity in Wythenshawe. I join with GMP in encouraging community workers to source information which can help tackle illegal activities that put local people at risk."

Operation Challenger targets organised crime across the whole of Manchester. Anyone with any information on the activities of organised gangs should call Greater Manchester Police on 101 or Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

Creating Community Art

The project was designed and led by the Young People and was inspired by the themes of positive thinking, caring for each other and raising aspirations to be the best you can be.

Jason Moffat, a young person from Wythenshawe, said: "I have never done anything like this before and it gives me the experience to be creative in a fun way."

WCHG Youth Work Operational Coordinator Joe Amos said: "This project allows young people to engage in something that is not only fun but makes a difference to the community. It's been great to see so many turn up in the school holidays and get involved in creating a design that matters to them."



Most of these appointments or visits will be pre arranged but occassionally staff carry out visits or inspections on an ad hoc basis which may mean they call without appointment.

If someone comes to your home claiming to be from WCHG, please ask them for identification.



You can still visit us at Wythenshawe House or Parkway Green House. WCHG service standards were launched in November 2015 and we now monitor waiting times for appointments at reception. We will also offer a room for customers if they need to speak to a member of staff in private.
