Wythenshawe Town Centre is a place with a plan. Building on what already makes Wythenshawe special and with Civic at its beating heart, the plan will bring new places to live and spaces for the community to come together.

Manchester City Council is working with placemaker, Muse, to come up with some big ideas to transform the town centre.

With the total investment expected to be more than £500m, it will provide new opportunities for people in Wythenshawe to live, grow and thrive.

It won't all happen overnight, but you'll soon start to see some changes at Civic, including a new public square, Culture Hub, workspaces and food hall.

In time, the plans will extend beyond Civic, with new, sustainable neighbourhoods within the town centre full of homes, businesses and green spaces to meet, relax and enjoy. The wider plans could see up to 2,000 new homes built in Wythenshawe. We are looking forward to working with you to grow Wythenshawe for the community and this is just the start. We're going to be out and about in the community to share what's planned and find out what you think about the vision for a renewed Wythenshawe.





## A place for all

Town centres should reflect the people who use them. They need to be safe, friendly, and open to everyone, giving everyone a fair chance to live, work, and enjoy life.

### **Green** streets

Like the original Garden City idea, we believe green spaces and plants make life better. This town will have lots of planting and walking and cycling paths to help people stay healthy and make the area more eco-friendly.

Everyone has their own idea of how they want to live, and homes should give them the freedom to do that. Our plans will bring new neighbourhoods with high-quality, ecofriendly homes for all kinds of people, from all walks of life.

### Central to tomorrow

We want to make sure that we build a town centre that is not just good for today but also for the future. Creating a great place to live for many years to come with everything that people need to live and thrive.

### Built to last

We are creating a place that is fit for the future, investing in improving the existing buildings and public realm at Civic so that they are energy efficient, climate resilient and low carbon. We will also be building new energy efficient homes that will help people to save money on their energy bills.

We know from talking to you how important Civic is to the community. It's already the beating heart of the town and the place that people meet. But it's getting tired and is in need of a bit of a facelift.

Manchester City Council and Muse are now joint owners of Civic, which means that together, we'll be taking care of the centre for now and for the future.

The Council has received £20m funding from the Government, which will be complemented by a further £11.9m from the Council. This investment will kick start the regeneration of Civic.

We're going to extend the public square at Civic where The Birtles meets Hale Top, creating a bigger, better space for outdoor events or just to hang out.

We're also improving the outdoor spaces with new paving and more plants to make the town centre a much greener, safer and more pleasant space to spend time in.

We spoke to the community about our plans for the Culture Hub last year but that's not the end of the conversation. We still want to hear your ideas on what else you'd like to see at Civic from shops, places to eat and drink to community spaces.

It's important to note, that while the work is being carried out, Civic will remain open throughout, and you will still be able to access all of your favourite shops.



# Plans for a new Culture Hub

Last year we talked to you about the plans to create a new Culture Hub within the former Co-op department store. We had loads of useful feedback about what you want to see there, and we have now submitted a planning application.

The entrance to the Culture
Hub on the ground floor will
have space for socialising,
meeting and eating. The
first floor will be home to a
mix of flexible community
and creative studio spaces.
These could be used for a
ton of creative activities, from
workshops and exhibitions,
to painting or dance classes
and community events.

Up on the second floor we'll be opening a new performance space with room for people to come and enjoy what's on. The new space will have everything budding performers need, including rehearsal rooms, studios and changing rooms.

If the plans are approved, we hope to start creating the hub in autumn 2025, which means we'll be looking to open in late 2026.

#### Places to work


We're also planning some new workspaces for independent start ups and growing local businesses. We will be fixing up some office space which is currently empty and bringing it back to life as a great new local business community.

We are working with social value experts Hatch to develop an ambitious approach to social value and community benefits.


